The Playwright: Mark Medoff, born 1940 in Mt. Carmel, Illinois, is the son of a physician (father) and a psychologist (mother). He grew up in Florida and did his undergraduate work at the University of Miami, and received his M.A. in English at Stanford, California. Medoff's first play, "The Kramer," was produced in 1973 under an Office for Advanced Drama Research grant at American Conservatory Theater in San Francisco. The New Theater for Now series at the Mark Taper Forum in Los Angeles subsequently produced the play. His third play, "When You Comin' Back, Red Ryder?" was named Best Play of its season in 1973 after an off-Broadway run of 302 performances. Medoff was received numerous distinguished awards for playwriting, including his second play, "The Wager".

The Play: "The Wager" was first presented at the Eastside Playhouse, in New York City, on October 21, 1974 for a run of 104 performances. Under the direction of Anthony Perkins it was the only off-Broadway play to be selected as a Best Play of the 1974 season.

The Director: John E. Wells was born in Starkville May 4, 1947 and is presently employed as an Information Technician with the Cooperative Extension Service at MSU. John received his B.S. degree in speech education from Mississippi State, and served four years in the U.S. Navy. Last year, John was guest director for the MSU production, "Where Has Tommy Flowers Gone?"
