RUTH ECKHARDT is making her first appearance for SCT as Josephine. Ruth says her experience for this role has been in "living this many years." She says she is proud to be a naturalized American and a loyal Mississippian of 41 years. Ruth and her late husband, Dr. Robert C. Eckhardt, reared a family of two sons and two daughters here in Starkville where Ruth taught in the public school system. KATHERINE CONROY is a veteran SCT performer having played many roles starting as a chorus member in "Little Mary Sunshine." She played the lead role of Lizzie in "The Rain Maker" as well as roles in four other shows. Katherine has also taken many of the backstage jobs and has done them all well and willingly. Katherine and her husband Jim have a family of "J" members, two sons, Jonathan and Justin, and a daughter Jami and one dog, Jenny. She is also kept busy in the Aldersgate choir, teaching church school, working with MSU Women's Club, and the MSU Veterinarian Wives.

TERRY REESE MCDOWELL is a newcomer to the SCT stage, her only theatrical experience being in high school. Terry is "on stage" a lot in her position as a second grade teacher with the Oktibbeha County School system. She is the mother of four children, Ledge, Sy, Jack, and Matt. She said she wanted to publicly thank her babysitter, B.L., for keeping the children so that she could be in the show.

SUZY RICHEY is another newcomer to the SCT stage. She has participated in theatre at both Delta State and the University of Mississippi. Suzy and her husband, Eddie, have one son, Michael Andrew, who is 20 months old. She is employed by the Starkville Daily News in advertising.

MARIANNE ULMER is another newcomer to the SCT stage. She is a Communication Education graduate from MSU and is now a Speech and Drama teacher at Henderson Junior High School. Marianne and her husband, Allen, have one son, Curt, who is nine. She is also a member of the Aldersgate choir.

JOHN HELMS is 16, lives with his father and stepmother, and has seven brothers and sisters. He enjoys working with people as evidenced by his many activities: Aldersgate Methodist Church, Boy Scouts of America, jogging, acting classes and shits put on at Aldersgate.

DAVID COOK is a veteran SCT member and actor. He has participated in all aspects of the productions from actor in four or five roles to set design and construction. His last set was for the MSU Symphony production of "Amahl." David is the Director of Psychology at Rolling Hills Mental Retardation Center while working on a graduate degree in Clinical Psychology. David's work history is most interesting including everything from Counselor for juvenile delinquents in Mexico, to waiter on top of the Tower of the Americas in the 1968 World's Fair. He is a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Symphony Association, and Association for Non-Traditional Students.

Everyone associated with "Close Ties" has worked hard to make this first attempt at more serious drama a success. In most of our past productions, SCT has tried to make audiences laugh. Lots of new folks came to auditions for this play, providing an embarrassment of riches in the casting process. Of the members chosen, five are new to Starkville Community Theatre (in performing roles) and three are returning after varying lengths of time away from SCT.

Even from the first, it was hard not to think of this group of people as a family. They have worked hard and well together. They even seem to like each other. They've been fun to work with, and I'll miss them when the family finishes its "vacation" and goes back to work.
