THE PLAYERS

ALICE CAROL CALDWELL (Martha McDermitt) A.C. won "Best Director" award for SCT's *Tintypes* in the Mississippi Theatre Competition in January, 1986. She has performed in *Blithe Spirit, The Philadelphia Story, The American Dame, John Brown's Body,* and *Harvey.* A music and choral teacher at Armstrong Middle School, she and her husband Price are parents of Delia, an MSU freshman, and Michael, an SHS junior.

BARBARA BOUCHILLON (Mary Margaret Donovan) Barbara played Karen in *Plaza Suite* and has worked backstage in several other SCT productions. She is on the SCT Board of Directors. Barbara is the wife of Charles and mother of the bride for daughter, Leslie, and mother in general to Rusty, Scott and David.

CATHERINE CONROY (Nora Hiller) Catherine is an SCT charter member, has worked backstage, and as an assistant director for previous performances. She has appeared in *Little Mary Sunshine, Curious Savage, The Man Who Came to Dinner, Bye Bye Birdie, Close Ties, Forty Karats,* and *Our Town.* Catherine is the wife to James and mother to Jon, Jami and Justin. Her interests include gardening, house plants, dancing, music and running.

TERRY REESE McDOWELL (Alice Monahan) Terry has appeared in three previous SCT productions: Close Ties, Philadelphia Story, and How the Other Half Loves. She has also worked backstage. She is an elementary school teacher because "I have a captive audience seven hours each week day." She has a passion for dancing and a wonderful family that puts up with her absences during plays.

DIXIE CAMP (Ann Conroy) Dixie is also a charter member of SCT and has worked backstage and as an assistant director in many previous SCT productions. She is making her stage debut in *The Octette Bridge Club*. She is a real estate broker and enjoys reading, needlework and photography.

MARSHA WILLIAMS (Lil Carmody) Marsha is originally from Baton Rouge, Louisiana, where she has had theatre experience with the Baton Rouge Little Theatre, Tulane University and LSU. REPORT FROM THE PRESIDENT

I am especially pleased to announce that, as of November 25, 1986, SCT's season memberships have surpassed that of 1985-1986. By the conclusion of this weekend's presentation of *The Octette Bridge Club*, we expect season memberships to reach record levels.

I attribute this growth to the hard work of Membership Vice President Terry McDowell, the success of this season's first production, *Harvey,* and of SCT's special "Give a Play for Christmas" promotion.

For the past five years SCT has **literally** gone "from pillar to post." Shows have been performed in six different locations (as many as four in one year). Moreover, the absence of a "home" has created not only enormous difficulties for rehearsals, set construction, storage, and performances, but has also taxed the time of many dedicated members.

But SCT has survived. It is financially stable, and its members consistently continue to provide excellent productions for a growing, vibrant, diverse community.

Today, as the renovation of the Greensboro Center is progressing, SCT's officers and Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees of the Starkville Public Schools are moving forward to finalize a joint-use agreement which will provide SCT a "physical identity" and the facilities to enhance the arts in the community and in the school system.

I urge your continued support of SCT as we move toward the tenth season.
