believed to have been written by Richard Burnett in 1913. The most popular version was recorded by Emory Arthur in 1928.

Ac-Cent-Tchu-Ate the Positive - 1945 (# 1)

Words and Music by Harold Arlen and Johnny Mercer
Written for the 1944 film, "Here Come the Waves," and recorded by
Bing Crosby and the Andrew Sisters on Dec. 8, 1944. The song spent
nine weeks on the charts in 1945, reaching No. 2. Johnny Mercer recorded his own version and topped the charts for two weeks in January
of 1945. The song was nominated for an Academy Award.

### Marvin's Room by Scott McPherson directed by Monroe Dewberry

Winner of the 1991 Dramatists Guild Hull-Warriner Award, the 1991-1992 Outer Critics Circle Award for Best Off-Broadway Play, and the 1991-1992 Drama Desk Award for Best Play. Marvin's Room is a hilarious and wondrous account of one woman's commitment to loving others first and her belief that giving such love has made her life unbelievably rich. The play centers on the reunion and hopeful reconciliation of two long-estranged sisters as they deal with age, family, and life.

### The Exact Center of the Universe by Joan Vail Thorne

directed by Bob Anderson ~ cast includes 4 women and 1 man. In this new comedy/drama, a small Southern town's self-appointed senior authority is faced with her only son's surprise marriage, unrest in her beloved church guild, and the realization that her culture and beliefs are not the only ones prevalent in the universe.

#### The Foreigner by Larry Shue

directed by Molly Watkins ~ cast includes 2 women and 5 men. Winner of two Obie Awards and two Outer Critics Circle Awards: as Best New American Play and as Best Off-Broadway Production. In a rural fishing lodge in Georgia, a pathologically shy young man, overcome with fear at the thought of making conversation with strangers, pretends to be from a foreign country and to speak no English. What he overhears under the guise of understanding no English fuels the non-stop hilarity of the play.

#### Bus Stop by William Inge

directed by Lyle Tate ~ cast includes 3 women and 5 men. In the middle of a howling snowstorm, passengers on a bus out of Kansas City must spend the night together in a welcoming road-side diner. A sexy chanteuse pursued by a belligerent cowboy, a scholar coming to terms with himself, a young girl experiencing her first taste of romance, and the café owner and bus driver's budding relationship entertain throughout the night.
