Meet the Cast

A Note from the Director.....

I was privileged to direct the first SCT production, "6 Rms Riv Vu" in the summer of 1978. We presented the play in the ballroom of what was then the Ramada Inn. We built the stage and the scenery wherever we could find an available space and rehearsed in the parish hall of the Episcopal Church of the Resurrection. We moved all the scenery and the stage platforms into the ballroom, lighted the set with spotlights borrowed from the MSU student union, and presented three nights of dinner theatre.

In the twenty-five years since then, I have been fortunate to work with hundreds of dedicated people doing their best to provide quality theatrical entertainment to the audiences of Starkville. And to all of you, I dedicate this show as a part of our silver celebration.
