

Backstories and Dreams

Early in Ron Osborne's *Seeing Stars in Dixie*, Clemmie, a 59-yearold widow, tells us that she regularly reads the movie fan magazine <u>Silver Screen</u>, a respite from washing dishes and tending her Natchez tea room.

The backstory of *Seeing Stars* involves location shooting of MGM's Raintree County in and near Natchez during spring 1956. Based upon Ross Lockridge's thousand-page novel (1948), the MGM film (1957) drew mostly negative or indifferent reviews but garnered five Oscar nominations, including Elizabeth Taylor's first, and attracted enormous audiences.

The film adaptation badly mangled Lockridge's first novel but managed to retain a modest sense of the novel's exploring how people's dreams and memories inform their present realities and define their life's future directions. In the film's <u>Raintree County</u> theme, Nat "King" Cole assured us that in a land where a raintree blossomed in gold you and I could enfold ourselves in dreams – which, the song suggested, could come true.

In the real world, Montgomery Clift, rather than inhabiting a room at Marjorie's, languished in a Los Angeles hospital recovering from near fatal injuries resulting from a booze- and drug-induced auto crash. Liz Taylor, nearing the end of her marriage to Michael Wilding, had developed an inordinate fondness for expensive champagne, but not for the subsequent headaches. In fact, most of the film's location shoots occurred in Danville, Kentucky, not in Natchez or its environs, and the most prominent Mississippi location was at the ruins of Windsor, a post-bellum mansion off a backwater dirt road twenty miles north of Natchez.

Early, Clemmie, the avid reader of <u>Silver Screen</u> magazine, says of seeing screen stars: "When they're dead, they're still alive!... I mean up there ... on the big screen ... in color ... talking, singing, dancing. They'll be there forever ... Elizabeth Taylor, bless her heart, will never die!"

Near the end, she returns to movies and dreams: "I'm not going to live forever in Technicolor . . . What matters is I worked for a dream, and that makes me a winner!"

So, as the ending amply demonstrates, between the real and the dream, Clemmie and Osborne chose to "print the dream."

Good choice.
