

About the Cast

HALEY AGNEW

Haley, a junior at Mississippi State University majoring in music education, is making her first appearance to the SCT stage with *Postmortem*. A native of Tupelo, MS, she has been involved from a young age with groups such as Pied Piper Playhouse, Tupelo Community Theatre, Tupelo High School Theatre and the International Thespian Society. Recently, she has been involved with MSU Theatre, serving as props mistress for *A Funny Thing Happened On The Way to the Forum* and acting in *The Madwoman of Chaillot*, which was featured in this year's Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival. She was also in last year's student-directed one-acts, and is currently a member of MSU's Lab Rats Comedy improv troupe.

SCOTT BRINKLEY

Scott is making his SCT debut, though he has been in many productions since he started performing with Tyler Junior College (Tyler, Texas) in 1989; at the age of 8, he played Macduff's son in *Macbeth*. He has worked with many companies since then, including Professional Summer Stock at North Idaho College and the Missoula Children's Theatre in Spokane, WA. He has trained with Mississippi School of the Arts, the Merrystreet Players, Birmingham Summerfest, Meridian Community College, and Virginia Commonwealth University. Recent roles at MSU include "David" in *Two Bottles of Relish*, "El Gallo" in *The Fantasticks*, and "Senex" in *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum*.

MJ ETUA

You may have seen MJ on the SCT stage in the annual summer musical revues and in the show *Not Now, Darling!*; *I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change*; *Deathtrap*; and *Inspecting Carol*. She has also directed *The Mouse Trap, Smoke and Mirrors*, and *Communicating Doors*. In the spring, MJ had the opportunity to appear in *Crowns* at the New Stage Theatre in Jackson. Also a playwright, she has written and directed numerous shows for Project P.L.A.Y., SCT's summer children's theatre. MJ teaches Theatre Arts and Oral Communication at Louisville High School and was the recipient of the 2006 Thad Cochran Educator of the Year in Theatre Arts award. She also serves as president of the Mississippi Theatre Association and as a member of several Southeastern Theatre Conference committees.

CHERRI GOLDEN

Cherri is thrilled to once again appear on the SCT stage. She made her dramatic debut in last season's *Terror By Gaslight* and displayed her musical talents the past two years in SCT's annual musical revue. Singing in the chorus for "25", "Welcome to the 60s!" and "SCT Goes to the Movies", Dr. Oppenheimer ventured onstage as Mrs. Culp in last season's "Terror by Gaslight", and then went back to the pit for "Back to Broadway". Performing as Lilly in tonight's production, she's very grateful for the fact that she can wear sensible shoes the rest of the day! BENJAMIN P. SHERWOOD

Mabry was the Starkville High School theatre director for many years. During the summer, she directs the MSU Summer Scholars' On Stage camp production for gifted and talented students. In September of this year, Mabry directed *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* for the Tennessee Williams Tribute in Columbus. Paula is on the Board of Directors for Starkville Area Arts Council and the Executive Board for Mississippi Alliance in Arts Education. As soon as this show is over, Paula and her husband, Don, will be going to London to see....you guessed it....theatre!

From the Director

Postmortem has been especially fun to direct because the play is about a real actor, William Gillette, who played Sherlock Holmes on stage over 1,300 times. He was one of the best-loved American actors of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. He collaborated with Sir Arthur Conan Doyle on several Sherlock Holmes plays. Gillette is the first actor to use the deerstalker hat as well as the meerschaum pipe.

His home, the eccentric castle in which our play takes place, is now a tourist attraction in Connecticut. It was this castle where Gillette brought home the cast of his latest New York show for a weekend of leisure and good food.

The *Postmortem* cast and crew have been a fantastic group. Everyone has pitched in to get things done. I appreciate the hard work done on the set by Christopher Walrath with help from so many other people.

Auditions for Next Show

Auditions for SCT's next production, A... My Name Will Always be Alice, will be held at the Playhouse on Sunday, November 12 and Monday, November 13 at 6.30 each night. Directed by Lyle Tate, the musical revue's cast is comprised of 5 women. The show will run February 8-11 & 13-17, 2007.

A... My Name Will Always be Alice's 5 actresses portray over 50 different characters during the 2-act revue with songs such as "Trash," "Watching All th Pretty Young Men," "Painted Ladies," "At My Age," "Lifelines," and more.

Auditions are open to any and all and will consist of a cold reading of a monologue from the script, the singing of pre-selected bars of "All Girl Band," and the option of singing one of two other pre-selected cuttings of songs from the production, "Wheels" and "Painted Ladies." In addition, ladies wishing to audition may bring 16- to 24-bars of a song they've prepared, as well.

Auditions will be held for role of Stanley on Wednesday, Nov. 15

Starkville Community Theatre will send a cut version of last season's hit, *Smok on the Mountain*, to the 2007 Mississippi Theatre Association Festival. Set for January 12-14, the festival - which features high school and community theatre competitions, workshops, meetings and more - will be held in Oxford.

The show will feature six of the original cast members, including Madeline Golden, Bruce Lesley, Kary Rogers, Paul Ruff, Krista Vowell and Molly Watkins. But the role of *Stanley* must be recast. Auditions for *Stanley* will be held Wednesday, Nov. 15 at 5:30 p.m., upstairs at the Playhouse on Main. Any one is welcome to audition, but the role calls for someone who can play guitar and sings bass.

Those wishing to audition should come prepared to sing one of three songs, "I' Fly Away," "Washed in the Blood," or "Amazing Grace." Each man will also read dialog from the script and will be able to perform a song of his choosing of the guitar (if he plays).
