Author's Note

hen most of us think of the 1950s, we think of rock 'n' roll, greasers, hot rods, Elvis, Annette, Fabian, DA., haircuts and teenage rebellion. But there was a flip side to this era - the side of harmony, innocence and the sincerity of dreams. It is the side that's been lost in the shuffle of progress. It was a time when most parents and kids listened and danced to the same music; when families partook of the ritual of gathering in front of the TV to watch their favorite variety shows, like the "Ed Sullivan Show" or "The Perry Como Show." It was a time when every family worked to fulfill the American Dream.

It was a period when four-part guy groups harmonized their way across the airwaves, jukeboxes and hi-fis of the country. Throughout the land, they would stand at a quartet of microphones, crooning a multitude of chaperoned prom-goers into dreamy romance.

They wore dinner jackets and bow ties (or perhaps cardigans and white bucks). Each move was drilled to precision. Each vocal arrangement soared to stratospheric heights of harmony. This sound crested right before rock 'n' roll stole the heartbeat of music across the globe.

During this time, guys across the country banded together to sing in the basement for fun. If things worked out they might be hired to sing at weddings, conventions, proms and country club socials. Inspired by the success of the recording stars, they made plans to move into careers of Fame and Fortune. But the musical taste of the USA was changing, and the country would not stop to listen to their dreams.

This is the story of such a group - FOREVER PLAID.

Once upon a time, there were four guys (Sparky, Smudge, Jinx and Frankie) who loved to sing. They all met in high school, when they joined the audiovisual club (1956). Discovering they shared an affection for music and entertaining, they got together and dreamed of becoming like their idols - The Four Aces, The Four Lads, The Four Freshman, The Hi-Los and The Crew Cuts. They rehearsed in the basement of Smudge's family's plumbing supply company. It was here they became Forever Plaid -a name that connects the continuation of traditional values of family, home and harmony.

Although rock 'n' roll was racing down the fast lane like a candy apple "vette," they believed in their music. As their sound developed, they sang at family gatherings, fund-raisers, and eventually graduated to supermarket openings and proms. They had little time for romance or leisure, for they supported their fantasy by holding down day jobs - Frankie was in dental supplies. Smudge was in bathroom fixtures. Jinx was in auto parts. Sparky was in better dresses. They devoted themselves to singing nights and on weekends. Then, finally, they landed their first big gig at the Airport Hilton cocktail bar - The Fusel Lounge.

February 9, 1964

En route to pick up their custom-made plaid tuxedos, they were slammed broadside by a school bus filled with eager Catholic teens. The teens were on their way to witness the Beatles make their U.S. television debut on the "Ed Sullivan Show" and miraculously escaped uninjured. The members of Forever Plaid were killed instantly. It is at that moment, when their careers and lives ended, that the story of FOREVER PLAID begins.

Through the Power of Harmony and the Expanding Holes in the Ozone Layer, in conjunction with the positions of the planets and all that astrotechnical stuff, they are allowed to come back to perform the show they never got to do in life.

And having completed their Mission of Harmony, our men in plaid must return to the cosmos. Although they may be gone, through this production their dreams live on forever.





James Comans (Francis) is absolutely thrilled to be appearing in his first SCT production, though he has been hanging around the theatre and its regulars for quite some time now. Before Forever Plaid, James could be seen in Theatre MSU productions, playing roles such as Jack in The Importance of Being Earnest and Guildenstern in Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead. He also fostered his love for comedy early on as a founding member of MSU's Lab Rats Comedy troupe. After Plaid is over, though, James's next adventure has been set for June as he marries his fiancée, Kristin, and sets out with her to build a life together. James wants to thank Kristin, his friends and family, but most of all, the amazing women working behind (and in) the scenes on Plaid. We all have heard "Behind every successful man is a great woman," but seldom before was that ever so, so true as in SCT's production of Forever Plaid.

Brian Hawkins (Smudge) is making his sweet 16th appearance on the SCT stage with his role as "Smudge" in Forever Plaid, and he couldn't think of a sweeter show in which to be performing. Brian's recent appearances include the 2007 SCT musical revue, The Power of One, and the rollicking farce Not Now, Darling in September 2006, in which he portrayed a philandering casino owner (TOTALLY playing against type). Favorite SCT roles include "Julian" in Communicating Doors in 2005, "Phil" in Inspecting Carol in 2003 and "Will Masters" in Bus Stop in 2002. When not running amok on the SCT stage, Brian works as the editor of the Starkville Daily News, recently celebrating his 10-year anniversary with the newspaper. He is also a member of First United Methodist Church, where he sings in the chancel choir, and is an active volunteer with Mississippi State's Famous Maroon Band and the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life, among other activities. Brian thanks Molly, Alison and Carole for their incredible dedication, organization and huge amounts of work on this show. To Lyle, Thomas and James, "I can't think of three other guys with whom I've had more fun or with whom I'd rather share this incredible performing experience. Let's do this!" Brian lovingly dedicates this performance to his parents, Ron and Joyce Hawkins, in celebration of their upcoming and well-earned retirement.

Thomas La Foe (Sparky) is tickled plaid to be part of this production. When he was a little techie back in Greenville he saw and traveled with a production of *Forever Plaid* and loved every minute and every note of the show. Now that he's all grown up, he finally gets a chance to don a plaid tux and belt out the tunes he had only heard from the light booth. For those of you who may be skeptical about the "grown up" part, you might be surprised to find out that he plans to graduate this May with his Masters in Instructional Technology. He has been working toward this goal since 2000 when he first came to MSU and to SCT. "I would like to thank all of my friends here in Starkville for helping me realize that this is home, and SCT for introducing me to these friends (and finding me a job!). Thank you Molly, Alison, Carole, Maddy and Tess for doing everything for us. This one is for all of you...and a little bit for me.:)"


